June - Awards Committee Meeting (Teleconference)

July - NGAUS Board of Directors Meeting

Mid-July - Notify states once list is approved by NGAUS board

August - Presentations at NGAUS conference

(First presented in 1989) Elected officials (state & local) Staffers & other civic leaders

Distinguished Service Medal



Oldest award (1950) Outstanding service by a Guardsman or Guard civilian



Meritorious Service Award (1972)



Any member of the National Guard, NGAUS or the Armed Forces of the United States, or any civilian assigned to a NGB or state HQ Meritorious Service Certificate

Performing acts of heroism and lifesaving acts





Valley Forge Certificate Non-life threatening

Garde Nationale Trophy (1989)

Significant achievement in civilian endeavors

<u>Theodore Roosevelt Leadership Award</u> for Company Grade Officers (2006)

State, territory or D.C. may submit no more than one ANG and one ARNG nomination each year

Eagle Rising Award for Warrant Officers (2011)

Nominees must be WO1-CW3 State, territory or D.C. may submit no more than one nomination each year
